Peer educators are aged 14–25. They deliver sessions to Brownies, Guides & Rangers on the following topics:

- Think Resilient – gives people the tools to build their mental well-being.
- Breaking Free – provides the tools to challenge gender stereotypes.
- Safe the world – helps members make a stand for safety.

For members aged 14 to 24. There are three levels: Bronze, Silver and Gold.

Four sections: volunteering, physical, skills & an expedition. For Gold you will also take part in a residential event.

The Queen's Guide award is the highest award you can work towards in Girlguiding and is for anyone aged between 16–30. Over 3 years you will develop your skills, contribute to projects in Girlguiding, take part in a residential, expand your network, and do a community project.

NEE Youth Network: Contribute to making the region more youth led & make sure their voices (and their peers) are heard. Help to plan events for 14–30 year olds and speak out about issues important to them.

Where will Girlguiding take you?



Young leaders are aged 14-17. Grow your skills and become part of a team of volunteers at Rainbows, Brownies or Guides. You can also take part in the young leader development programme (YLDP).

The YLDP is completely flexible and made up of 12 modules to help you discover and explore your leadership skills. You design your own journey and decide which modules you want to complete. You can gain badges for completing 4, 8 and 12 modules. Find out more on the Girlguiding website.



A network for young volunteers aged 18-30. Build your skills & have fun through 7 pathways:

- Challenge yourself to an adventure
- Take part in international opportunities
- Gain event experience
- Share your skills
- Lead the way by volunteering for Girlguiding
- Develop others
- Lend your voice & get involved in decision making



The leadership development programme (LDP) is a self-led, flexible learning journey for adult volunteers who want to become a Leader.



It is made up of 3 sections:

- Building Foundations – This includes managing safety and risk, following our policies and keeping information safely.
- Engaging guiding – This includes planning for good guiding, celebrating every member and involving girls in decisions and planning.
- You and your team – This includes developing as a team, managing the unit's money and organising your unit.

Lead away permit: For Rangers and young leaders. Develop the skills and knowledge to take 4-8 of your peers (including yourself) away for 2 or more nights. Complete 7 challenges to boost your skills.

Going away with scheme: For qualified adult leaders. Up to 9 modules depending on whether you want to take your unit on a UK based self-led residential, to an activity centre, or abroad.
